- I. HUMAN ANATOMY, PHYSIOLOGY AND KINESIOLOGY
- Structure of the human body
 - Reproduction, Urinary – Circulation – Skeletal - Senses
 - Function and location of the major organs and organ systems of the human body - brain
 - Macular-skeletal (including connective tissue) characteristics, contractions
 - proprioceptors - origins, insertions and actions of muscles, muscle fiber and other tissues
 - Nervous
 - Cardiovascular
 - Lymphatic
 - Skin/integumentary
 - Respiratory
 - Digestive
 - Endocrine – Immune systems – Excretory system
 - Urogenital

- II. CLINICAL PATHOLOGY AND RECOGNITION OF VARIOUS CONDITIONS
- Contraindications
 - Signs and symptoms of disease
 - Healing mechanisms of the body as they relate to various condition
 - Medical terminology – typed of medications -
 - Hygiene and sanitation in Massage Therapy/Bodywork
 - Injuries (e.g. strain/muscle tears, whiplash, muscle spasms, sprain/ligament, tendonitis, etc.)
 - Joint disorders (e.g. osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, facet dysfunction/subluxation, TMJ dysfunction, etc.)
 - Neurological disorders (e.g., constipation, ulcers, spastic colon, irritable bowel syndrome, etc.)
 - Gastrointestinal disorders (e.g. constipation, ulcers, spastic colon, irritable bowel syndrome, etc.)
 - Skeletal dysfunction (e.g., scoliosis, Kyphosis, lordosis, etc.)
 - Skin conditions (e.g., eczema, psoriasis, etc.)
 - Muscle/fascia conditions (e.g., chronic muscle spasm, acute muscle cramp, torticollis, fibromyalsia, tension headaches, etc.
 - Emotional states (e.g., stress, depression, anxiety, grief reactions, etc.)
 - Respiratory conditions (e.g., asthma, bronchitis, etc.)
 - Circulatory conditions (e.g., high blood pressure, edema, etc.)
